Okja (2017), directed by Bong Joon-ho, is a South Korean-American film that follows a young girl, Mija, on a daring mission to rescue her genetically engineered "super pig" from a greedy multinational corporation. Blending adventure, satire, and emotion, the film explores themes of friendship, ethics, and the dark side of industrialized food production.



PLOT SYNOPSIS

Okja (2017) tells the story of Mija, a young girl living in the mountains of South Korea with her grandfather and her beloved companion, Okja a massive, gentle "super pig" created through genetic engineering by the powerful Mirando Corporation. The film does not preach vegetarianism directly but encourages awareness urging viewers to think critically about where their food comes from and what values they support through consumption.

In relation to real-world practices, Okja mirrors the operations of modern agribusiness and genetic engineering, where animals are commodified and their welfare is secondary to profit. The film also touches on issues of environmental sustainability, biotechnology ethics, and the exploitation of both animals and marginalized communities within global supply chains.

The learning it offers for a better future is deeply human: that progress without ethics leads to destruction, and that compassion whether toward animals, people, or the planet must be at the heart of development. Through Mija's courage and unwavering love for Okja, Bong Joon-ho reminds us that change begins with empathy and that even one individual's resistance can expose the truth behind powerful systems.
